

Message from Ian Cleland, CEO



During our first two years we have worked closely with our Principals and Governing Bodies to develop The Trust so that it is supporting transformational improvement.

Since conversion, pupils in our primary academies have improved faster than national

expectations in reading, writing and mathematics. Whilst, their counterparts in the secondary academies are rapidly closing the gap with national expectations for progress of pupils in mathematics and English.

This is due to the rapid advancement in the quality of teaching, which is now being judged more than 70% good or better in primary, up from 43% and from 53% to 75% in secondary

academies. Thanks go to all our staff for their commitment to providing an outstanding educational experience for our pupils.

Our pupils now enjoy coming to school more than ever and as a result attendance rates in half our academies have increased to higher than the national average.

We recently had good news of a £1.5m capital allocation which is now being used for building maintenance and improving the quality of the learning environment for pupils across our academies.

We are increasingly being recognised as having a wider vision beyond high quality classroom practice to an engagement with community and ensuring a rounded education for all pupils. We support the development of the whole child within an ethos that enables them to develop to their full potential while enjoying their learning.


Pupils get on their bikes at Star Academy

Developing best practice across The Trust

Here at The Trust, we are committed to ensuring that all our staff are able to carry out their role efficiently and effectively and to support their own personal development. As part of this, our forums are at heart of this vision and are run at no extra cost to our academies.

Their key aim is to bring our people together to discuss common issues and provide solutions, which can then become best practice used consistently across all academies.

The termly forums we run are:

- Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)
- English subject leaders
- Mathematics subject leaders
- Special Education Needs and Disability (SEND)
- Achievement
- · Technology for Learning.

Each group has been responsible for developing at least one piece of best practice. These include:

- EYFS forum creating a template for the end of year reports for parents of the children in nursery and reception
- English and mathematics subject leader forums developing the 'Subject Leader Tool Kit', which is filled with tips and templates to support the gathering of evidence to judge how well the subject is doing
- The SEND forum ensuring the implications of a new draft SEND Code of Practice are understood by everyone, as well as supporting the development of an audit tool for Special Education Needs Coordinator to judge SEND provisions throughout our academies and suggest next steps
- Achievement forum is helping to develop an Achievement Strategy which includes a timetable for all assessments taking place during the year and has also supported the development of the TIM system.

The forums are coordinated by different members of The Trust team so that their expert knowledge can steer their development. However as the forums grow and progress, the academies are taking far more of a lead, such as the EYFS forum which is now almost totally self-sufficient. Here a member of staff from each academy takes the responsibility to organise the event as and when the forum is hosted at their school.

Now more than ever we are encouraging staff to take the lead in organising and presenting the forums and hope they will continue to grow – embracing the challenges and successes alike.
